This prize is to recognize two outstanding Minnesota History Day entries, one Junior Division and one Senior Division, on a topic of humanitarian action in history. Entries will be considered that study a person or group of people who made a significant historical contribution with their work to improve the welfare of others. The prizes, sponsored by the American Swedish Institute, will grant \$100 to each winning entry. The prize is dedicated to the life and example of Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish diplomat who heroically led the rescue of approximately 100,000 Hungarian Jews from July 1944 to January 1945.

Women of Color in History

Sponsor: Anonymous. Award: Two \$150 prizes

This prize will be awarded to an outstanding entry on a woman of color in history. Topics may range from advocacy to political action for women's rights and representation, health care, education, athletics, the arts, voting reform and more. The sponsor encourages students to examine the role of women as changemakers and how their actions have positively impacted members of their community and/or at large. The sponsor is especially interested in lifting up absent narratives - women's stories and experiences that have previously been (or are) marginalized and excluded from mainstream history.

Frequently Asked Questions about Topical Prize Results

Who sponsors Topical Prizes?

A variety of organizations and individuals sponsor Topical Prizes based on their interests and the annual History Day theme.

How are Topical Prizes judged?

Topical Prize results are separate from the category results and judging that took place at State History Day. Students nominated their own entry for up to three prizes and a separate panel of judges review materials submitted in advance to select winners. Prizes are evaluated on the fit within the prize criteria and the historical quality of the entry.

Who are the Topical Prize judges?

Sponsoring organizations generally provide the judges for Topical Prizes. If a sponsoring organization is unable to provide judges, Minnesota History Day recruits judges from the general judge pool who are interested in judging Topical Prizes. All Topical Prize judges receive training on their role.

Will I get comments from the Topical Prize judges?

No. Topical Prize judges do not provide written feedback on the entries that they view.

How do I redeem my prize?

Cash prizes will require that the students provide a Social Security number by completing a W9 form and returning it to the State History Day office. This information is kept confidential at the Minnesota Historical Society. Students will not receive awards until their forms are returned. You will be contacted in the week following the contest via the email address you used to register for State History Day.

How are prizes split among group entries?

Only <u>one</u> group member needs to return a W9 and the check will be issued to that individual. It is their responsibility to split the award among any group members.

When will I get my prize?

From the date we receive your W9 form, it takes 30 days to process the check and be mailed out to you.
